

The Community Foundation of Randolph County has received a \$100,000 grant as part of the eighth phase of Lilly Endowment Inc.'s Giving Indiana Funds for Tomorrow (GIFT VIII) community foundation initiative. This unrestricted grant can be used for any charitable purposes the community foundation chooses.

As part of this GIFT VIII grant opportunity, each community foundation that achieved 100 percent board member giving during the grant period from January 1, 2024, through June 30, 2025, was eligible to receive an unrestricted grant of \$100,000 per county served. This grant is in recognition of the important role that the Community Foundation's board of directors plays both in leading the Foundation and serving communities across Randolph County.

“We are proud to share that 100% of our board members are personally committed to supporting the foundation, not only through their financial contributions, but also through their time, talent and testimony,” said Lisa Jennings, Executive Director of CFRC. “This grant is a testament to their dedication and to the trust Lilly Endowment Inc. places in our ability to strengthen Randolph County through philanthropy.”

Linda D. Brown

A transplant to Randolph County in 1973, Linda D. Brown has been connected to the Community Foundation of Randolph County since its inception in 1993.

As part of her 40+ years in banking, Linda started her career in the Trust Department, assisting with scholarships and managing client accounts. At the founding of the Community Foundation, she assisted in fundraising in support of the nascent organization through estate planning conversations with a client.

Linda's engagement with the Community Foundation did not end there though as she subsequently served on our Board of Directors for several years during our second decade of existence.

"I donate to CFRC because I feel a responsibility to support charitable services of today and the future," Linda says. "Giving is a part of my Christian faith and values, whether financially or in service. I see this as building value and strength in our local community."

While she has been a longtime supporter of the Community Foundation – and the Women's Fund, in particular, through donations of items for the annual auction – Linda Brown recently created an enduring legacy with the Community Foundation when she established the Linda D. Brown Dare To Lead Fund, an unrestricted fund. "I like being able to start a fund and support other funds [e.g., the Women's Fund] that will go on doing good after I am not long able to support them," she shared.

In addition to the Community Foundation, Linda has been a supporter of First United Methodist Church, Countryside Christian Church, Kids Hope, Athena, Saratoga Lions Club, Tri Kappa Sorority, Angel Tree, Cancer Services, Shalom Food Pantry, Salvation Army, St. Vincent Hospital Auxiliary, Girls Softball, 4-H, Goodwill, Attic Window, Union City's Community Help Center, Friends of Winchester Library (FOWL), Gideons, Journey Home, and PBS stations.

"As John Wesley stated, we are to do all the good we can, by all the means we can, in all the ways we can, at all the times we can, to all the people we can, as long as ever you can," Linda stated.

In 2016, the Wick's Employees Giving Fund was established at the Community Foundation of Randolph County by Mike Wickersham in honor and in memory of past and present employees for the support of charitable causes throughout Randolph County. The endowed fund is used in order to help support our grantmaking to nonprofit organizations serving our community.

What is an Endowment?

Helping donors achieve their charitable goals is another important activity of the Foundation. We work with individuals and organizations that want to create a lasting legacy in Randolph County. For as little as \$10,000, donors can create a permanent endowment fund that generates income to benefit any charitable cause they wish to support.

How it works:

The donor's gift will be invested as principal, which will never be spent. Instead, grants and donations from the fund will come from the income it generates. In this way, the original gift remains intact, allowing the fund to make a lasting impact on Randolph County—now and for generations to come.

The 4 Main Ways to Leave a Gift to Charity



Specific gifts:

Refer to a specific dollar amount or specific piece of property.



Residual gifts:

Are gifts of any assets that remain after all other gifts, taxes and administrative expenses have been met.



Percentage gifts:

Designates that a percentage of the state is to be distributed to charity.



Contingent gifts:

Become effective when primary beneficiary dies or disclaims the property.

Some Flexible Ways to Impact Future Generations

What is an Unrestricted Fund?

Do you love finding that \$20 bill from last winter the first time you break out the coat when the temperature drops? It means that you have a few dollars to use however you want.

The Community Foundation loves that feeling too because it means that we have monies to grant to local nonprofit organizations serving our community. Except, instead of a coat, we find those dollar bills to spend in the earnings of the investments in which the gifts to our endowed funds have been placed.

Helping donors achieve their charitable goals is an important activity of the Foundation. We work with individuals and organizations that want to create a lasting legacy in Randolph County. For as little as \$10,000, donors can create a permanent unrestricted endowment fund that generates income to benefit local nonprofit organizations via the Community Foundation's grantmaking.

During the recently completed GIFT VIII, some donors benefitted from the \$2-for-\$1 matching opportunity in establishing a new fund. These new unrestricted endowment funds included:

Thanks to the \$2-for-\$1 matching opportunity offered through the recently announced GIFT IX, YOU can open an unrestricted fund with an initial gift of \$3,334 or more.

What is an Acorn Fund?

Thanks to a Community Foundation of Randolph County giving plan, you now can build up charitable endowment funds that support annual charitable grants and have extraordinary long-term impacts.

An Acorn Fund helps you harness the power of financial markets to multiply the value of your contributions over time. All you have to do is make regular contributions and take a charitable tax deduction for them. Investing even small amounts regularly will build an endowment that grows dramatically.


When your Acorn Fund "matures," it becomes a permanent charitable fund within the Community Foundation of Randolph County and makes annual grants for the purposes you specify.

Your Acorn Fund will need to reach a minimum of \$10,000 within five years before it can become an endowed grant-making fund within the Community Foundation of Randolph County. Your contributions, multiplied by good investment, will reach these goals in a surprisingly short period of time.

When setting your goals, you will need to consider:

Fund purpose,
How quickly you want to meet your goal, and
Your own financial situation

Decide on contributions. You can invest as little as \$500 per quarter or \$2,000 per year. The more you give, the faster you will reach your goal and the larger your annual tax deduction. You can add to your fund at any time, even after it has become a Community Foundation of Randolph County endowed fund and has started making grants. The Community Foundation of Randolph County will place your Acorn Fund contributions in a non-risk bearing account where it will earn interest.

IMPORTANT TAX LAW CHANGES THAT MAY AFFECT HOW YOU GIVE

On July 4, the “One Big Beautiful Bill Act” (OBBA) was signed into law, making several key tax provisions permanent and introducing new rules that could shape how and when you choose to make charitable gifts. Since so many of you care deeply about maximizing your impact for Randolph County and beyond, we wanted to share a few highlights.

A More Predictable Tax and Estate Planning Landscape

The new law made several key provisions of the Tax Cuts and Jobs Act of 2017 (TCJA) permanent, providing more clarity for long-term planning.

- **Estate and Gift Tax Exemption:** The exemption rises to \$15 million per person (\$30 million per married couple) in 2026. Our experience shows that donors continue to leave legacy gifts for charitable purposes, driven by their values.
- **Standard Deduction:** The standard deduction increases to \$15,750 for single filers and \$31,500 for married couples filing jointly in 2025.
- **Top Income Tax Rate:** The current top income tax rate of 37% was made permanent.

This stability makes it easier to plan ahead, especially for donors considering lifetime gifts or estate gifts.

New Opportunities for Charitable Giving

Starting in 2026, new tax laws will take effect that may influence how you give

- **For high-income donors:** The tax benefit for those in the top tax bracket will be capped at \$0.35 for each dollar of itemized deductions, down from \$0.37. You may want to talk with your advisors about giving in 2025 before the new limits take effect.
- **New Deduction for Non-Itemizers:** Non-itemizers can now deduct up to \$1,000 (single) or \$2,000 (married) for cash gifts. This new deduction applies to gifts given in 2026 and later.
- **New Floor for Itemized Deductions:** A 0.5% of AGI floor has been introduced for charitable contributions for itemizers. Donors who give annually but won't meet the new deduction floor may consider "bunching" multiple years of giving into one larger gift, especially into a donor-advised fund, to receive tax benefits while maintaining annual support for charities.
- **New Deduction for Donors Age 65+:** If you are age 65 or older, you can take a \$6,000 deduction in tax years 2025-2028, whether you itemize or not. This may free up additional money for meeting your charitable goals.
